Today, I'm going to tell you about the up-and-comer in the California cryptid world known as the Fresno Nightcrawler.

Fresno Nightcrawlers look simple yet incredibly strange. They are bipedal creatures whose legs seem to make up a majority of their height, reaching a little under 5 feet tall. Nightcrawlers seem to lack arms, or at least have very small ones, as they appear to be simply a smallish round upper body on legs.

It has short, thin, and almost stilt-like feet below it's lengthy legs. Some cryptozoologists argue that there appears to be some sort of webbing

spanning from the knees to the torso, though others say it looks more like fabric of some kind. They walk with a wobbly and unnatural gate, swinging the torso slightly as a leg stretches forward. All of
